

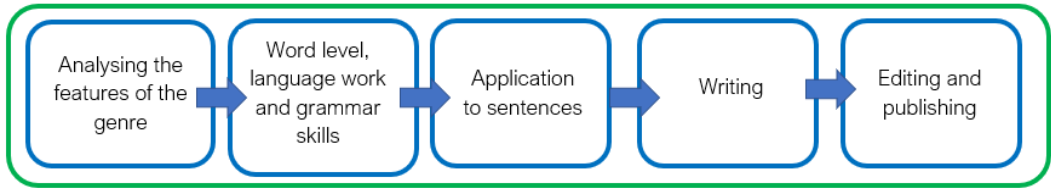


Year 6 Writing Long Term Plan

Year 6 English Writing

At Eastfield, we follow a five-step writing process and in Year 6 we will learn to write for different purposes: to entertain, persuade, discuss and inform.



What will we be writing in our English Lessons?
 We will learn to write for a variety of audiences through different narrative and non- narrative genres.

Cross- curricular writing
 We will be using the writing skills, that we learn in our English lessons, across all other subject areas.

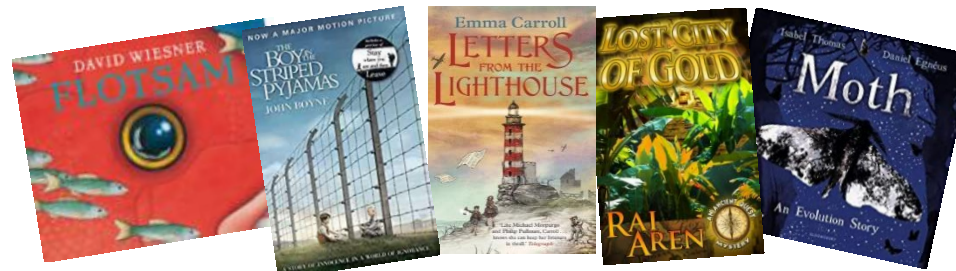
Handwriting
 In Year 6, we will join letters using a cursive style.

Spelling
 We will learn to spell using a sounds and written symbols approach as well as using morphology to spell through meaning. Year 6 will also learn to read and write the UKS2 Statutory Spellings.

Content to be taught and applied in writing this year

Word	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The difference between vocabulary typical of informal speech and vocabulary appropriate for formal speech and writing
Sentence	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Use of the passive to affect the presentation of information in a sentence (e.g. John broke the window in the greenhouse. / The window in the greenhouse was broken) The difference between structures typical of informal speech and structures appropriate for formal speech and writing (e.g. the use of question tags or the subjunctive form)
Text	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Linking ideas across paragraphs using a wider range of cohesive devices (e.g. repetition of a word or phrase, chains of reference, grammatical connections, punctuation) Layout devices to structure text
Punctuation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Use of the semi-colon, colon and dash to mark the boundary between independent clauses Use of the colon to introduce a list and use of semi-colons within lists How hyphens can be used to avoid ambiguity (e.g. man eating shark / man-eating shark, or recover / re-cover) Use of ellipses (as a cohesive device) Use of dashes for parenthesis
